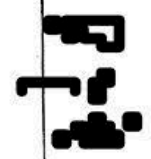

Widespread coordinated movements

In Europe, different genres techno developed, among them: ambient and trance, which are much they sound; breakbeat, which incorporates hip-hop elements; and Gab House, an aggressive and abrasive Dutch and German creation that drive the beat up to a manic 250 beats-per-minute.

Nowadays techno, subgenres all, seems to be at a crossroads. With an increased number of raves, Moby signing and outings such as "See the Light" — not to mention the genre's growth of the alternative rock scene — it's clear the audience is growing.
